Examples of (MIS) Trust in the Bible

Instance where TRUST was required: Peter walking on water

Peter step out of the boat on faith in God without giving it a second thought, then when he took his eyes off Jesus because of fear and his surroundings, he lost faith and started to sink into the water. Read the whole chapter to get the reactions of the other disciples.

Matthew 14: 25-31

25 And in the fourth watch of the night Jesus went unto them, walking on the sea.

26 And when the disciples saw him walking on the sea, they were troubled, saying, It is a spirit; and they cried out for fear.

27 But straightway Jesus spake unto them, saying, Be of good cheer; it is I; be not afraid.

28 And Peter answered him and said, Lord, if it be thou, bid me come unto thee on the water.

29 And he said, Come. And when Peter was come down out of the ship, he walked on the water, to go to Jesus.

30 But when he saw the wind boisterous, he was afraid; and beginning to sink, he cried, saying, Lord, save me.

31 And immediately Jesus stretched forth his hand, and caught him, and said unto him, 0 thou of little faith, wherefore didst thou doubt?

Instance where TRUST was given: Moses - The book of Exodus

Moses' life depended on the favor of God from birth. When he became adult he was able to recipricate some of his affection and appreciation for God by being faithful to his instructions and believing in his word. God was pleased with Moses and annointed him with many things, such as the history of the world. With the knowledge granted him, Moses was able to write the first five books of the bible. He was able to impart continued favor to the children of Israel and reproduced the 10 Commandments and God's laws for us to live by.

Exodus 34: 27-28

27 And the Lord said unto Moses, Write thou these words: for after the tenor of these words I have made a covenant with thee and with Israel.

28 And he was there with the Lord forty days and forty nights; he did neither eat bread, nor drink water. And he wrote upon the tables the words of the covenant, the ten commandments.

Instance where TRUST fell short: Eve & the Serpent

Eve was very naive. We can say that in the present because we are living in the aftermath of her two-fold action. Adam is another story.

Genesis 3: 1-13

- 1 Now the serpent was more subtil than any beast of the field which the Lord God had made. And he said unto the woman, Yea, hath God said, Ye shall not eat of every tree of the garden?
 - 2 And the woman said unto the serpent, We may eat of the fruit of the trees of the garden:
 - 3 But of the fruit of the tree which is in the midst of the garden, God hath said, Ye shall not eat of it, neither shall ye touch it, lest ye die.
 - 4 And the serpent said unto the woman, Ye shall not surely die:
 - 5 For God doth know that in the day ye eat thereof, then your eyes shall be opened, and ye shall be as gods, knowing good and evil.
- 6 And when the woman saw that the tree was good for food, and that it was pleasant to the eyes, and a tree to be desired to make one wise, she took of the fruit thereof, and did eat, and gave also unto her husband with her; and he did eat.
- 7 And the eyes of them both were opened, and they knew that they were naked; and they sewed fig leaves together, and made themselves aprons.
- 8 And they heard the voice of the Lord God walking in the garden in the cool of the day: and Adam and his wife hid themselves from the presence of the Lord God amongst the trees of the garden.
 - 9 And the Lord God called unto Adam, and said unto him, Where art thou?
 - 10 And he said, I heard thy voice in the garden, and I was afraid, because I was naked; and I hid myself.
 - 11 And he said, Who told thee that thou wast naked? Hast thou eaten of the tree, whereof I commanded thee that thou shouldest not eat?
 - 12 And the man said, The woman whom thou gavest to be with me, she gave me of the tree, and I did eat.
 - 13 And the Lord God said unto the woman, What is this that thou hast done? And the woman said, The serpent beguiled me, and I did eat.

The Enemies



Distraction, Confusion, & Doubt

A special shout out goes to **Emotions**, the quickest instigator of sliding into sin. **Cowardice**, the truest way to hide yourself along with its best buddy, **Complacency**.

The devil and his minions are busy. The enemies they send to your life can paralyze you into nothingness if you let them.

Sometimes they put it in a cute package and call it procrastination, but it's more than that. I have had many years where I was stuck at procrastination station and perfectionist lane, two destinations that are honey traps. They look good on the outside, but when it comes time to do the work, the stress on your body is beyond measure.

An action I have started taking when my mind starts to spiral down a rabbit whole is to praise Jesus and give God thanks. It snaps me back into focus right away. I even use the exercise when I feel myself getting worked up or if I'm provoked to the point of cursing. Saying "thank you God, thank you Jesus," has a great way of bringing the joy and purpose back into your life. I've been recommending this trick to everyone, so you're welcome.

Distraction

a thing that prevents someone from giving full attention to something else.

For example, as a writer, my head turns by little thoughts everytime I sit in front of my computer to work on a book project. I have to get a cup of tea and snacks, look up the definition of a word, review songs for my motivation playlist, shop for new notebooks online, play with my kids, or any number of things; my list is extensive.

Confusion

the lack of understanding; uncertainty.

When you are unsure of something, you are filled with the dread of not knowing. It can riddle you with fear and start you down a research rabbit hole that can be unending.

Doubt

to lack confidence in : distrust

Similar to confusion, doubt brings on feelings of uncertainty that makes you not believe in you and what you are trying to accomplish. It's a trick of the devil that sometimes induces feelings of fear which can lead to a paralysis of action and or inconsistencies. Don't fall for it.

Emotions

instinctive or intuitive feeling as distinguished from reasoning or knowledge.

All of the enemies of Focus are related to expressions of emotions. Feelings can be irrational and without reason. Emotions can carry you away to express youself in ways that will not have the desired effect of what you are trying to obtain, so it is best to take a deep breath, pray, and ask for guidance from the Father.

Cowardice

Lack of courage or firmness of purpose

Complacency

self-satisfaction especially when accompanied by unawareness of actual dangers or deficiencies

Neutral

not engaged on either side

There are two responses to fear, fight or flight. Cowardice, complacency, and neutrality are on similar sections of the spectrum. They are driven to flight by fear. They rob a person of any signifigance because there is nothing to learn when you constantly take yourselves out of situations. There is no growth or blessings to be achieved when you don't stand firm in faith and prayer. It takes the faith of a mustard seed, and if you can't even muster that, there are no prayers the Father can answer for you when the minimum amount of trust is the key to unlock all your blessings.

These enemies of focus rob so many of their purpose, their faith, and their blessings. It is such a lobor that the spirit has to endure when all it takes is for someone to call on Him in earnest.



Pride

It is consciousness of one's own dignity. It is pleasure that comes from some relationship, association, achievement, or possession that is seen as a source of honor, respect, etc.

Lust

It is usually intense or unbridled sexual desire.

Greed

A selfish and excessive desire for more of something (such as money) than is needed

Envy

A painful or resentful awareness of an advantage enjoyed by another joined with a desire to possess the same advantage

Gluttony

It is an excess in eating or drinking

Sloth

A disinclination to action or labor

Wrath

A strong vengeful anger or indignation

Vanity

An inflated pride in oneself or one's appearance

Drunkenness

A given to habitual inebriation due to the excessive use of alcohol

Deceit

It is the act of causing someone to accept as true or valid what is false or invalid

Pride

Pride is often seen as a destructive and sinful attitude that separates individuals from God and others. The Bible contains several passages that address pride and provide guidance on how to break down and overcome this sinful trait. Here are some key biblical principles on pride:

- 1. Proverbs 16:18: "Pride goes before destruction, and a haughty spirit before a fall." This well-known verse warns that pride can lead to downfall and destruction. It's a reminder of the consequences of an arrogant attitude.
- 2. Proverbs 11:2: "When pride comes, then comes disgrace, but with the humble is wisdom." Humility is contrasted with pride, emphasizing the value of a humble spirit and the wisdom it brings.
- 3. James 4:6: "But he gives more grace. Therefore it says, 'God opposes the proud but gives grace to the humble.'" This passage highlights the idea that God actively opposes the proud but extends grace to those who are humble.
- 4. Matthew 23:12: "Whoever exalts himself will be humbled, and whoever humbles himself will be exalted." Jesus teaches the importance of humility and how those who exalt themselves will ultimately be humbled.
- 5. Philippians 2:3-4: "Do nothing from selfish ambition or conceit, but in humility count others more significant than yourselves. Let each of you look not only to his own interests but also to the interests of others." This passage encourages selflessness and humility, considering others as more important than oneself.
- 6. 1 Peter 5:5-6: "Clothe yourselves, all of you, with humility toward one another, for 'God opposes the proud but gives grace to the humble.' Humble yourselves, therefore, under the mighty hand of God so that at the proper time he may exalt you." Peter echoes the idea of God's opposition to the proud and the need for humility.
- 7. Luke 18:9-14: The parable of the Pharisee and the tax collector shows the contrast between the prideful attitude of the Pharisee, who boasted about his righteousness, and the humble attitude of the tax collector, who acknowledged his sinfulness and sought God's mercy. Jesus teaches that it was the humble tax collector who went home justified.

To break down pride biblically:

- 1. Acknowledge Your Pride: Recognize when pride is manifesting in your thoughts, actions, or attitudes.
- 2. Repentance: Turn to God in repentance, confessing your pride as sin and seeking His forgiveness.
- 3. Cultivate Humility: Pray for and cultivate humility in your daily life, considering the needs and interests of others as more important than your own.
- 4. Seek God's Grace: Rely on God's grace to help you overcome pride and grow in humility.
